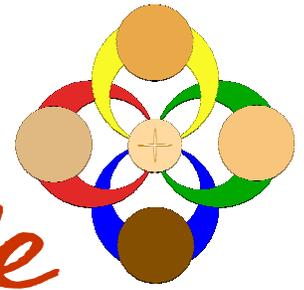

How to Talk to Your Priests and Pastors

Dear Friends: As we near the end of Lent, here is some good advice from a pastor friend of mine about how to think about your relationship with your Pastor or Priest. Please don't take any of this personally. While true, none of it is aimed directly at you.

1. ***YOU are a source of encouragement to us.*** All too often the people in our pews imagine that clergy are islands of devotion – except, of course, when we fail spectacularly and publicly. We aren't. Like everyone else we draw encouragement from others who are faithful and courageous. You shouldn't be that way for our sake, of course, but don't forget, there are days when we draw renewed strength from your example.
2. ***Don't forget to show up.*** A bishop or a search committee may have been instrumental in our coming to your parish, but we count on your presence. In one ancient Rabbinic story God tells the children of Israel, "If you obey the Law, I am God. If you don't, I am not." The story didn't mean that literally, but it makes an important point. God works through people and through God's church. That work requires your presence.
3. ***Don't compliment my sermons.*** React to them. I would rather hear you struggle with what I've said from the pulpit or tell me that you disagree and why, rather than say, "That was nice."
4. ***Remember, I'm not here to be the religious or spiritual performer.*** Clergy take responsibility for fostering and nurturing the spiritual life of a congregation, but we are not there to be the one who believes, sings, prays, or professes the faith for all of you. When we do it brings out the worst in us and in you.
5. ***Remember that I can't "fix" you.*** Like every caregiver, I wish that I could fix things for you. I can't. Only God can heal you and even God cannot nurture our healing when we resist God's help. I will walk with you, listen to God alongside of you, and offer advice when and where it seems appropriate and welcome. But there are spiritual decisions that are all your own.

6. *Please don't pick on my family.* They are in this because they are devoted to God and to me, but like all of us they are human. They make mistakes. They have their own growing pains and they can be defensive on my behalf. Clergy often describe the lives of their children as “life in a goldfish bowl.” Remember, the memories they have of the church are shaped in dramatic ways by your love for them. Just as surely, abusive behavior can alienate them.

7. *No one is perfect.* When you are unrealistic about me, it can make it difficult to relate to you in an honest, transparent fashion. Don't make us out to be little “g” gods or paragons of virtue. We can't possibly fulfill those expectations.

8. *Even clergy need grace.* We all have bad days and we all live in a world marked by sharp differences of opinion, unmanageable stress, and the pressure to be everything to everyone. Like you, we will have moments when we are impatient, when we lose our temper, or when we react out of fear or a sense of betrayal. We try to remember to say we are sorry, but we will still need grace, forgiveness, and understanding.

9. *We can't hold together a church that you are determined to re-make to suit yourself.* We work hard to discern the will of God, but no one knows the will of God in the absolute sense of the word. Along the way, we will feel honor bound to make a decision you don't approve. Wait long enough and we will make one that others don't like. If we offer transparent, sound reasons for making a choice, we hope you will remember that we are doing the best we can to hear God and to hear you. If you think that can be done without disagreement, you must be living alone.

10. *We don't like talking about money any more than you do.* We might even like it less. But we live in a world in which many good things can only be accomplished by raising money and spending it. We will try to avoid asking for the wrong thing. We will focus on vision, not vanity. We hope that you will remember that the money you give is for something far larger than any of us.

11. *Bring your gifts to the table.* Jesus didn't call the Lone Ranger. He called twelve people who were asked to find twelve more, who – over the centuries – have called billions of others. You are God's gift to the world in the making and there are contributions that only you can make. Nudge us and offer those gifts. Our lives will be enriched and yours will become more of what God created you to be.

12. *Pray for us.* These are challenging days for the church. They are also days filled with potential. You nurtured us in this vocation. Please pray for us. We will pray for you.

International teacher, Pema Chödrön explains:

This is actually a big point, because the less there is of you, the less you focus on yourself, the more you're interested in and curious about other people. Who you live with and who you rub up against and who you share this world with is a very important part of enjoying your life.

That's the answer to how to enjoy your life. It's to show up and have a sense of curiosity about whatever might appear that day, including it all in your sense of appreciation of this precious human birth, which is so short.

I don't want to call it delight, although it can feel like that. It's more curiosity. Some people say, I know what's going to show up today — the same old thing. ***But it's never really the same old thing.***

Even in the movie "Groundhog Day," every day was the same old experience for Phil Connors, until finally he learned that caring about people was the answer.

We only exist in relation to everything else. Our very nature is dependent on relationships. If your relationships aren't happy ones, your life can be a living hell. So, it's vital to invest time in close and meaningful connections. (upliftconnect.com)

Meditation, breath work and yoga alter brain waves, heart rate and respiration, positively affecting the central nervous system and brain chemistry, tapping into the brain's powers to transform itself at a cellular level, re-wiring it and reducing our tendency to fall into behavioral ruts or patterned thoughts, feelings or actions, thus healing and aligning body, mind, and spirit. This capacity is called ***Neuroplasticity***.

"Neuroplasticity makes our brains extremely resilient and is the process by which all permanent learning takes place, such as playing a musical instrument or mastering a different language. Neuroplasticity also enables people to recover from stroke, injury, and birth abnormalities, overcome autism, ADHD, learning disabilities, depression and addictions, and to reverse obsessive-compulsive patterns.

Neuroplasticity has far-reaching implications for human life and culture from education to medicine. Its limits are not yet known. However, this same characteristic, which makes your brain amazingly resilient, also makes it vulnerable to outside and internal, usually unconscious, influences. In his book ***The Brain That Changes Itself: Stories of Personal Triumph from the Frontiers of Brain Science***, Norman Doidge calls this the "plastic paradox." ("Neuroplasticity: The 10 Fundamentals of Rewiring Your Brain.")



Upcoming Lenten Study Series

There will be a series of classes presented each Wednesday night at 6:30 during Lent.

(These classes will also qualify as part of confirmation class requirements)

Below is the list of class subjects.

God | Faith is a Quest | Brian McLaren: “If you ask me, ‘Is God real?’ I first have to ask, ‘Which God are we talking about?’” With these words, Brian McLaren gives voice to a common struggle among people of faith – who exactly is this God we worship? Is God a mighty fortress, solid and unchanging? Is God a mystical, unknowable force that floats around us like a vapor? How can we speak of faith if we can’t even speak of God with any certainty? How can we chart a course through the often-murky waters of Christian tradition and find our way to God?

Religion | Spirituality Is Not Enough | Lillian Daniel: What does it mean to be spiritual? Is it the same as being religious? Lillian Daniel pushes back at this question that has been stirring up the cultural conversation for a while now. She asks us to consider how the seeds of faith to take root and thrive. What role does organized religion play in helping – or hindering – growth? If religion is the problem, why has it held fast for thousands of years? In this age of religious pluralism, is it possible or even desirable to stick with our age-old traditions?

Jesus | The Revolution Of Love | Mark Scandrette: What does it mean to walk in the way of Jesus? To explore this question, Mark Scandrette looks to the ancient Japanese concept of the Dojo. What if our churches became places where we practiced being like Jesus? What if we were serious about joining in with Jesus’ Revolution of Love? What if we took the kind of social and economic risks Jesus took and reshaped what it means to be a Christian? As Mark invites us into the Dojo, we find ourselves looking at a Master who might be asking us to walk down a path we never imagined.

Salvation | Abundant Life Now | Shane Hipps: The cross of Christ stands as a symbol of God’s saving work. But what, exactly, does it mean to be saved? From what? For what? Is salvation a reward we claim at death or something meant to change our lives right now? For Shane Hipps, these are the questions we need to answer if we are to truly receive the release that comes with salvation in the here and now.

Cross | Where God Is | Nadia Bolz-Weber: The cross sits at the center of our faith, and yet our understanding of what exactly happened on that cross remains conflicted and confusing. Was Jesus our proxy? The payment? The only way to appease an angry God? Nadia Bolz-Weber reminds us that our theories about the cross tell us as much about ourselves and our view of God as they do about Jesus and salvation.

Bible | A Book Like No Other | Lauren Winner: Why read the Bible? This is Lauren Winner’s central question. For Lauren, an avid reader, there remains something odd about the way Christians read the Bible. Why do we keep turning to the same stories in search of some new revelation? What is it about the Bible that makes it worth repeated reading? What gets in our way as we read the Bible and try to make sense of it? These are issues the church has wrestled with for centuries and yet we keep at it. We keep coming back to this book and its strange narrative full of plagues and miracles and destruction and rebirth. So why do we do it?

Church | An Imperfect Family | Bruce Reyes-Chow: Bruce Reyes-Chow knows he’s not inventing the metaphor of the church as family. So he suggests we take our changing notions about what it means to be a family and let them seep into our understanding of the church. For Bruce, it’s the messiness, the dysfunction, and the joy that comes from complex relationships that make church worth hanging on to. So how do we stay connected to this sometimes-broken family system? What does it mean to commit ourselves to the church family, for better or for worse?
